




State of High School Soccer Nationally

Most Popular Sports Nationally



IN THE IMAGE: The U.S. Soccer Development Academy will move to a 10-month season beginning in the 2012-13 season.

CHICAGO (Feb. 10, 2012) – The U.S. Soccer Development Academy has announced it is moving to a 10-month season starting with the 2012-13 season.

After receiving overwhelming support from the Development Academy membership, the Academy is moving to a schedule beginning in the fall of 2012 that runs from September through June (or July based on postseason play). This creates a format that is similar to those followed by the elite soccer playing nations around the world as the Development Academy and U.S. Soccer continue their goal of closing the performance gap with the top soccer nations.

"If we want our players to someday compete against the best in the world, it is critical for their development that they train and play as much as possible and in the right environment," said U.S.

Men's National Team head coach Jurgen Klinsmann. "The Development Academy 10-month season is the right formula and provides a good balance between training time and playing competitive matches. This is the model that the best countries around the world use for their programs, and I think it makes perfect sense that we do as well."

All team jerseys must have a different Arabic number, including goalkeeper jerseys.



Required Equipment Rule 4-1-1i2







- Only those names, patches, emblems, logos or insignias referencing the school are permitted on the team uniform, except as in 4-1-1 (d), (f) and (g).
- (d.) A manufacturer's logo/trademark appearing on both sides of the socks is legal.
- (f.) One manufacturer's logo/trademark or reference is permitted on the outside of each item which may not exceed 21/4 square inches and may not exceed 21/4 inches in any dimension.
- (g.) An American flag, not to exceed 2 by 3 inches, and either a commemorative or memorial patch, not to exceed 4 square inches and with written state association approval, may be worn on the jersey provided neither the flag nor the patch interferes with the visibility of the number.

The player's name may also appear on the team uniform.

SHINGUARD



SHIPPING PACKAGE

Shinguards must meet the NOCSAE specifications. The NOCSAE seal and the appropriate height range needs to appear directly on the shinguard OR on a label attached to the shinguard.

BEGINNING FALL 2012

Beginning with the 2012 fall season, the <u>front</u> of the shinguard must be permanently marked with the NOCSAE seal and the height standards for that guard.

Comments: The use of soft-padded soccer headgear is permitted but not required. Schools, parents and students are free to make their own assessments relative to this piece of equipment. The relevant ASTM standard can be found at www.astm.org.







Illegally Equipped Player Stays Off

In an effort to treat all illegally equipped players the same, players with illegal equipment shall be removed on the first caution, which is given to the coach, and those players cannot re-enter the game until the next legal substitution opportunity.

That revision in the rules for 2011-12 was one of nine changes approved by the NFHS Soccer Rules Committee at its Jan. 24-26 meeting in Indianapolis. The NFHS Board of Directors subsequently approved the rules changes.

Since the coach receives the first caution for an illegally equipped player, Rule 4-3 previously allowed a player Rule 4-3 previously allowed a player who had been removed but not cautioned to re-enter during a dead ball. Beginning next season, all players removed for illegal equipment will re-enter at the next legal substitution opportunity. For subsequent cautions issued for illegally equipped players, cautions shall be issued to the player.

Play 1: Five minutes into the match, the referee notices A6 is wearing a watch (or any other illegal equipment). Before the next throw-in, the referee asks A6 to depart the playing field, cautions the team A coach and that coach elects to play short. Ruling 1: A6 may re-enter at the next legal substitution opportunity for Team A. Team A could have opted to allow A13 to enter for A6 at the stoppage for the caution. Previously A6 could have re-entered at the next dead ball

Play 2: Using the facts from Play 1, the team A coach has already been cautioned for A6's illegal equipment.
